<sup>1</sup>Now the serpent was more crafty than any other beast of the field that the LORD God had made.

He said to the woman, "Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" <sup>2</sup>And the woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden, <sup>3</sup>but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die." <sup>4</sup>But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not surely die. <sup>5</sup>For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." <sup>6</sup>So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate. <sup>7</sup>Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked. **A** The Epistle is from Romans, chapter 5.

<sup>12</sup>Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned— <sup>13</sup>for sin indeed was in the world before the law was

given, but sin is not counted where there is no law. <sup>14</sup>Yet death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sinning was not like the transgression of Adam, who was a type of the one who was to come.

<sup>15</sup>But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many. <sup>16</sup>And the free gift is not like the result of that one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brought justification. <sup>17</sup>If, because of one man's trespass, death reigned through that one man, much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man Jesus Christ.

<sup>18</sup>Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men. <sup>19</sup>For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

This week's tidbit comes from 1941: Sigmund Thies and Fred Schoenbeck were accepted as new members. Members voted to keep the old hymn book instead of getting new ones and to give \$15 to school to buy things needed for one year.

#### **February: Fried Chicken Dinners**

On Feb. 7, 1971, we sold our first fried chicken dinners. We served our last dinners on Feb. 4, 2018. But, we have statistics for only the last ten years.

**2008:** 325 dinners served, 140 carry-outs. Profit: \$2421.42. We served more dinners that year than any year on record.

**2009:** 240 dined in, 135 carry-outs. Profit: \$1774.13

2010: Numbers not recorded. Profit: \$1931.91

**2011:** 220 dined in, 90 carry-outs. Profit: \$1813.97

**2012:** 248 dined in, 80 carry-outs. Profit: \$1776.38. We sold boxes of fried chicken for the first time this year with either a half or whole chicken. Ninety pieces of chicken were boxed and sold.

**2013:** 170 dined in, 116 carry-outs, 160 pieces boxed. Profit: \$2229.25 with donations of food and paper products.

**2014:** 160 dined in, 92 carry-outs. 155 pieces boxed. Profit:\$1852.68 with donations of cabbage, oil, chicken batter, mashed potatoes, and newspaper ads.

**2015:** 180 dined in, 120 carry-outs, 165 pieces boxed. Profit \$3275.40 with donations for oil, chicken batter, and mashed potatoes.

**2016:** 220 dined in, 144 carry-outs, 380 pieces boxed. Profit \$3422 with donations for oil, chicken batter, and two \$500 Thrivent Action Team cards for supplies.

**2017:** 250 dined in, 154 carry-outs, 255 pieces of boxed chicken. Profit \$2487.89 with donations for oil, chicken batter, propane, and one Thrivent card for \$250.

**2018:** 179 dined in, 161 carry-outs, 96 pieces for boxed chicken. Profit \$3483.33 with donations for oil, chicken batter, propane, and two Thrivent cards for \$500.

With donations, our profit went up each year except 2014. We are very thankful for Thrivent, for Gilster Mary Lee in Chester who donated oil and chicken batter, and for both Select and Midwestern who donated propane. Weather information was not recorded, but it surely played a part in how many we (or didn't) serve each year. Selling boxed chicken was a big hit.

Church members did the meal prep, worked the dining room, organized for carry-outs, fried chicken, and provided desserts, mostly pies. Each dinner required a lot of people and was the perfect place for good fellowship!
